BENEATH THE SURFACE

"The kingdom of heaven is like leaven that a woman took and hid in three measures of flour, till it was all leavened." Matthew 13:33

You might have noticed, as we've been reading through Jesus' parables, that he frequently talked about "things beneath the surface"- seeds, yeast, treasures, motivations and so forth. He talked about how the state of our hearts determines the fruit that our lives produce, and how our

hidden thinking is as morally significant as our actions.

Often, he was referring to the good and powerful work of the kingdom of God shaping our character, as seeds produce harvest, or yeast transforms the whole of the dough, or even how springs of living water can flow forth from within us. But sometimes he also warned of the darker things that lurk beneath the surface of our lives. Sometimes he warned of the ways our pride, anger or lust can corrupt our whole selves from within. He warned of the ways our desires can trip us up. He warned of the corrupting "leaven of the Pharisees and Sadducees" and how self-righteousness or hypocrisy can take root within.

Jesus teaches that much of the most important work in our lives is done beneath the surface, whether for good or ill, in the patterns of our thinking, the power of our emotional state, the foundation of our self-identity, the space we give ourselves (or don't give ourselves) to just be and know who we are before God. Of course, that means that to do our best work we actually need to be aware of the things beneath the surface.

Ruth Haley Barton, who writes extensively about spiritual formation, tells of taking a personal retreat on the Florida coast. As she was swimming and floating alone in the surf (which she also admits is a bit of a sketchy idea already) suddenly a fisherman came running along the beach shouting, "Get out of the water! Get out of the water!" After swimming as hard as she could toward shore, then running through the shallows, she looked back to see a long, dark shadow gliding beneath the water exactly where she had just been a moment before. Breathlessly she asked the fisherman, "Was it a shark?" He said, "No! It's a salt-water crocodile!" before continuing up the beach yelling for people to get out of the water. She goes on to write:

What lies beneath the surface—of the ocean or our lives—really matters... My awareness of it or lack of awareness doesn't make it any less real... The point is that there are things lurking under the surface, and it could even be that others are seeing these things though I am not.

She then goes on to commend the importance of a time of self-reflection in the presence of God, a time to examine ourselves and figure out, for ourselves, that "This part of me, if left as it is, will be no good for anyone," and to invite God's transforming presence into that place.

One of the ways that we grow as Christians, and come to better understand our purpose in Jesus, is by regularly taking the time to get a good honest look at what is within. Again, this was central to all of Jesus' teaching. Remember what he said at the beginning of his ministry: "Repent! (Think again, challenge your own views and assumptions of the world and of yourself!) For the kingdom of heaven has come near."

This might mean a deliberate time in your devotions to not just learn something new about God, but to look within yourself at the forces, good and bad, that are shaping the ways that you think or feel. What are the hopes that spur you on? What are the hurts that trip you up? Take time, in the quiet, to be aware of how those forces shape your actions, words, habits and rhythms. What is there to celebrate? How can we witness and name the ways God has been faithful in bringing

renewed life and growth in us? And where are there dark shadows swimming in our lives? What are the powers pushing on us? What are the ways our views of the world are working counter to the character and calling of God?

In our rushed and hurried modern way of living, taking the time and space to find quiet and look within ourselves is really hard to do. And in a culture where failure is often met with derision, or "canceling" by others, it can be scary to confess, or to give others permission to look behind our masks. But our spiritual health really matters. What is the state of your soul? And who do you feel is safe enough that you can have those kinds of conversations with them? Rather than drowning the sound of your soul in activities and general busyness, instead take the time to ask, "What do you really need?" And invite Jesus into that space.

As we continue to work through Jesus' stories through the summer, I urge you to spend some time sitting quietly before God, inviting the Spirit to speak to you in those times with loving correction, to name the shadows swimming beneath the surface. And, in those moments, to also see a loving God looking upon you with grace and acceptance, cheering you on to a more authentic, healthy and whole way of life.

RESTORING LIVES AT THE GOSPEL MISSION

For the past several years, we have had the privilege of partnering with the Medford Gospel Mission to bring the love and light of Christ to our community. The Gospel Mission's goal is to restore people's relationships with God, self, others, and their community. The Mission believes this happens best through meaningful relationships which empower people to take responsibility for their actions and lives. To effectively accomplish this goal requires more than just handing people some food! It also means making meaningful connections and really being the face of Christ for them by showing acceptance,

respect, giving encouragement, etc.

To make a difference in people's lives we must see them and love them as Jesus does.

MORE THAN A FOOD SERVER

That's why our church family has not only provided financial support to the Gospel Mission. We've also consistently provided a team of volunteers who serve at their restaurant called The Main Ingredient. Recently, the Mission upgraded their dining room and kitchen, making dramatic changes to

improve its appearance and the experience of those who are served. The whole atmosphere is much more welcoming! Our volunteer team serves at The Main Ingredient on the fourth Tuesday of every month, from 4:30-6:30PM.

From 4:30 PM to 5:30 PM, we gather in the restaurant with the residents and build connections with them. The interactions are made easy with pre-planned topics about life experiences to share with one another (Ex: "What kind of pet do you have?" "Did you have a childhood nickname?") - not hard, not embarrassing, or overly revealing. It's a chance to listen as well as speak and get to know a little about each other.

Then, from 5:30 to 6:30 PM, we serve dinner to the restaurant patrons. The emphasis is not to try to serve the food as quickly as possible. Instead, we work at a somewhat relaxed speed. Our volunteers are encouraged to talk and interact with the guests, serving as the face of Christ to them, not just a deliverer of food.

SERVING THE MEAL

The meal/serving time is well organized. The restaurant tables are divided into sections with each pair of volunteers assigned to a specific section. FYI: When we have sufficient team members, we prefer to pair up our volunteers. That way you're not waiting on tables alone, but working together with a partner. If you physically cannot carry platters of food, no worries. We have other roles that need to be filled – someone to pour drinks, someone to plate and dress bowls of salad, someone to ladle soup, someone to arrange portions of bread and butter in baskets. One of my

> personal favorite roles is to be one of the dessert servers. Dessert servers get to roam the restaurant with platters of delicious desserts

which the diners can choose from when they have finished their main course.

BE PART OF OUR INTERGENERATIONAL

It's really a very fulfilling experience, for to do it right, you're being the face of Christ for the hungry people we are feeding. It's also a way to connect with a variety of folks from the

Westminster family. We are an intergenerational volunteer team! We are always looking for more volunteers and would be happy to hear from anyone who is interested. If

you are looking to find your purpose in Christ and have a heart for this kind of ministry, please pray over it and contact me to connect with our team.

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
Introducing... Rosa Romano

If you attend WPC, you are blessed with many mothers - spiritual mothers, that is! These are women who love God and live out Biblical beliefs and values. They have spiritual depth, strength and insights that come from years of walking with the Lord, relying on Him in times of trial, seeing His faithful goodness over and

over again. Using their God-given experiences, wisdom and compassion, spiritual mothers come alongside the next generation on life's journey. Author Susan Hunt describes spiritual mothering this way: "When a woman possessing faith and spiritual maturity enters into a nurturing relationship with a younger woman in order to encourage and equip her to live for God's glory."

You'll find a beautiful example of this relationship in the Book of Ruth. As a Moabite, Ruth did not originally share her mother-in-law Naomi's faith, yet the latter demonstrated her love of Jehovah and reflected His character in such a way that Ruth would eventually declare, "...where you go I will go, and where you lodge I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God my God." (Ruth 1:16) Over the years, Naomi had inspired and equipped Ruth to follow the Lord. In the New Testament, we see a spiritual mothering relationship between Mary and her cousin, Elizabeth. In the early stages of her miraculous pregnancy, Mary turned to her older relative; Elizabeth's Spirit-filled greeting upon seeing Mary preceded the magnificent song of praise offered up by the mother-to-be of Jesus. (Luke 1:46-55) With spiritual maturity, Elizabeth then nurtured her younger cousin for three months before Mary returned to her own home, strengthened for what lay ahead. And you'll find this very special kind of relationship here at Westminster, too.

Dear spiritual mothers among us, though you are not wearing special name tags or stoles, you are precious to your church family and we are so grateful for you! For the encouraging smiles, warm hugs, and comforting shoulders...for meals, cards, and calls...for the hands clasped in prayer and the spoken reminders of God's promises...for imparting strength and hope...for sharing your Spirit-filled lives...THANK YOU and HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY!
